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Friendly Fire

Some time ago the guest minister at our church. Dr. James Carter, Director - Division of Church Minister Relations. Louisiana Baptist Convention, chose as his topic, "Surviving Friendly Fire." As his sermon unfolded, the more intently I listened because, whereas, Dr. Carter tuned his words toward the church and its members, his subject matter could be easily revised to fit the Masonic Fraternity. To avoid any suspicion of plagiarism, I called Dr. Carter and received permission to use some of his ideas and research material.

are shooting at you. Often Chancellorsville, General "Stonewall" Iackson was wounded and subsequently

died, when fired upon by a North Carolina regiment, a unit of Confederate skirmishers serving as outguards. In this case "friendly fire" cost the life of a famous general and could have affected the outcome of the battle. Throughout the Civil War, there are many other instances of mistaken identity, whereby "friendly fire" caused casualties among one's own forces.

Following the euphoria of Desert Storm, the American public was shocked to learn how many casualties sustained by the American army, were the result of "friendly fire." Thirty-five of the 145 killed and 72 of those wounded were the result of "friendly fire." Seven MIAI tanks and 20 Bradley fighting vehicles were lost to "friendly

As I pondered these tragic losses, it occurred to me that most

of the casualties we suffer, most of the wounds we sustain, most of the hurt we feel. as individuals and as Masons, comes from "friendly fire." Those people who you think are on your side, by supporting you, strengthening you, helping you, are often the ones who hurt you the most. It pains me when I hear a brother Mason speak in derogatory terms about another.

The relationship between the Grand Lodge and our constituent lodges has been strained because many of our brethren have used the Grand Lodge as the scape goat for all their troubles. They do not accept that the Grand Lodge is the organization which guarantees the regularity of the lodges under its control. Without the Grand Lodge, no lodge could function as a member of that great body of Masons through-



Grant us the perseverance to really be good Entered Apprentices, Fellow Crafts, and Master Masons. Amen.






out the world. We owe the Grand Lodge our support and our loyalty. Remember that the largest number of members of the Grand Lodge is made up of the officers of our individual lodges. Let not your "friendly fire" weaken our Grand Lodge.

Recently there was a story in the newspaper that the Pentagon had developed so-called anti- fratricidal devices. "Friendly fire" is really a form of fratricidal fire: brother against brother. These devices are designed to keep one's own troops from firing on each other. They are electronic beacons which blink out pulses of near infrared light which can be seen at great distances, thus warning those on the same side not to fire. Is it necessary for Masons to wear an anti-fratricidal device to keep Masons from firing at each other? I think not.

I believe if we resort to that principle which made us great: to live a service oriented life, we can survive "friendly fire." It is a life that is accountable for what we say and what we do. You are accountable to yourself, to other people, but especially to God. In spite of the attacks from without, I believe we are our own worst enemies. If we keep biting and devouring each other, we will destroy each other and our great fraternity.

Instead, let our light so shine that all people will know that we believe in the brotherhood of man under the Fatherhood of God. So mote it be.

Your Behavior

Masonic behavior is a subject, if taken into the Lodge for debate, could take up a lot of time. Behavior changes with attitude and the ever shifting social structure.

In the old charges behavior was divided into six sections:

- 1. Behavior in Lodge.
- 2. Behavior after Lodge with members who did not attend.
- 3. Behavior when brethren meet outside the Lodge.
- 4. Behavior in the presence of non-members.
- 5. Behavior at home and in your neighborhood.
- 6. Behavior toward a strange brother.

Behavior is generally affected by two means:

- 1. By those around you.
- 2. By age.

Normally, we are respectful of the people around us, more now than when we were younger. We also have much more tolerance, mainly because of those who tolerated and respected us.

Our behavior is a reflection of who we are and as a Mason this image either improves or taints our institution. To be a considerate member of the Lodge and to our brethren is easy. To be a person of integrity to strange brothers, nonmembers, and even those who would seek to discredit the fraternity, is the most important act of brotherly love one could do for his Lodge and its members.

A Lodge is only as good as its worse member, therefore strive to be a better person.

ANCIENT MASONS

"Ancient Masons," was the

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name assumed by a body of Masons who, in 1738 seceded from the regular or legal Grand Lodge of England. They did this because of changes the Institution made on the ritual work.

The Ancients called themselves "Ancient Free and Accepted Masons" and were the new Lodges. They practiced the old ritual work and condemned the Moderns, as they called them, for changes made in that work. The Moderns, were called "Free and accepted Masons" and were the old Lodges of England. They adopted the new style of ritual work formed by Anderson, Preston, and others.

These differences kept the two bodies apart to the extreme, that there would be both in the same community and sometimes, side by side. They would clam the same jurisdiction and argue over who was right and who was clandestine.


In 1813 the two bodies resolved their differences and joined hands, but the Lodges were spread through out the world, and particularly in America. They turned out to be impossible to align. Both are recognized by the Grand Lodge of England and both have the same rights and benefits which are accorded a legal Lodge of Master Masons. Although you will find the different Lodges in United States their jurisdictions are limited to each state. This is why we have:

Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, and on and on.








THE TENETS

(Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth)

The principal, or chief, tenets of Freemasonry are, Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth.
