Terry Wayne Stogner was initiated, passed and raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason on February 27, 1990 in Lamesa Lodge No. 909, where he then served as Worshipful Master in 1995-96 and was presented the Golden Trowel Award in 1992. He currently holds membership in fourteen Texas Masonic Lodges, and is an Endowed Member in all of them, and has also served as Worshipful Master in Staked Plains Lodge No. 598, Coahoma Lodge No. 992, and Milam Lodge No. 11, as well as Treasurer in Milam Lodge No. 11 for three years. He received his 25-Year Service award from Tabernacle Lodge No. 1195. He holds an Esoteric A Certificate since 1993, and received an Esoteric Life Certificate in

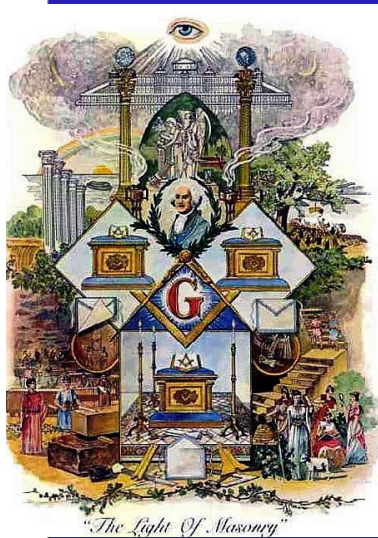
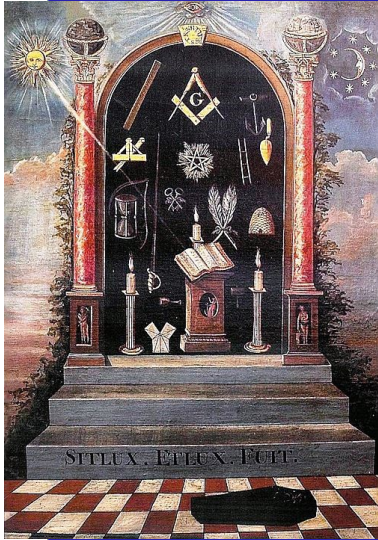

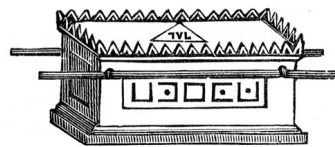


Terry became District Deputy Grand Master in Masonic District No. 80 in 1997, for Grand Master Joe Regian, and also served as District Deputy Grand Master At-Large in 2012. He was a District Masonic Relations Officer for District No. 80 in 1997-1998 under Grand Master Harry G. Cunningham. He has served the Grand Lodge of Texas as a District Instructor since his appointment in 2002, a position he still currently holds. He is also a member of the Masters, Wardens, and Secretaries Association of the 80th Masonic District.



His service to The Grand Lodge of Texas has included the Petitions and Returns of Lodges Commit-

tee from 2003 through 2005, and the Special Assignments Committee in 2011-2012. Terry's appointment to the Grand Lodge Committee on Work was in 2005 and he has worked diligently on that Committee ever since, and served twice as Chairman. Five Cornerstone ceremonies were done by Terry for Grand Master Walter W. Rogers, and he has assisted with Grand Lodge Funerals as well. Brother Stogner has served on the Planning Teams for Grand Masters T. E. "Gene" Carnes in 2010 and Walter W. Rogers in 2013. He is a member of the Sam Houston Hall of Fame, benefitting the Grand Lodge Library and Museum.



Terry received his York Rite Degrees in Lamesa Chapter No. 463 in 1990, and presided as Most Excellent High Priest in Big Spring Chapter No. 178 in 1999, where he was also an Endowed Member. He was District Deputy Grand High Priest of the 33rd Capitulur District in 2011. His current membership is in Keystone Chapter No. 174 in Midland, Texas.



He was greeted in the Royal and Select Master of Texas Lamesa Council No. 378, Lamesa, Texas in 1990, and then served as Illustrious Principal Conductor of the Work in 1993 and 1995 in Big Spring Council No. 117, Big Spring, Texas, and became an Endowed Member in 2009. He also was Right Illustrious Deputy Master in Big Spring Council No. 117 in 1992, 1994 and 1998, and then became Thrice Illustrious Master in 1999 and received the Order of the Silver Trowel in 2005. Terry served as District Deputy Grand Master in the 33rd Cryptic District in 2010, and holds current membership in Keystone Council No. 112.



In the Knights Templar of Texas Commandery, he was Knighted in Midland Commandery No. 84, in Midland, Texas, and is an Endowed Member. Terry was inducted into the Tex-

He received a 32nd Degree in the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, in the Valley of Lubbock, where he is an Endowed Member.



His membership in the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine is in Suez Temple, in San Angelo, Texas. Terry is also an Endowed Member and Past Worthy Patron in the Big Spring Chapter No. 67 of the Order of The Eastern Star, in Big Spring, Texas.

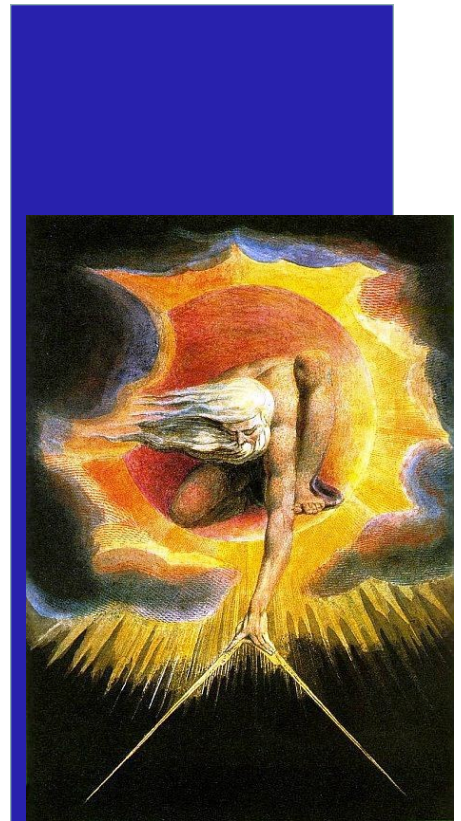

In 1978, he established the Stogner Pumping Service, Inc., an oil and gas pumping service and consulting firm, and serves as President. He is the owner of Lamesa Radio Paging Service, an RRC paging radio repeater tower leasing service since 1981, and he established Mr. T's Rental Storage in 1990. Terry also is President/CEO of Associate Water Systems, LLC, which was established in 1991, and he is CEO of Sandy Creek Operations, Inc., an independent oil and gas operation, which he launched in 2003. He is also President/CEO of Rengots, Inc., a successful real estate holding sales and leasing company, which he formed in 2003.

Terry married Jackie Nell Cave on July 24, 1979, and they are the proud parents of a son, Charles Walter Stogner, of Graham, and a daughter, Lisa Janell Stogner, who lives in Brownwood. They have been blessed with a granddaughter and grandson. Terry and Jackie are active members in the Sec-

ond Baptist Church in Lamesa. His hobbies include fishing, hunting, gun collecting, and rebuilding boats and outboard motors. The year is half over and it is time to be thinking about how to fill our line with officers for the coming year. Please let me know how you wish to serve.

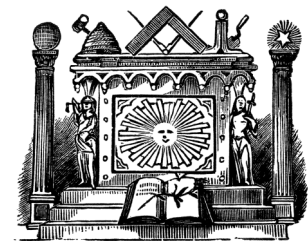
It is my prayer that we continue to practice what it means to be a mason in all aspects of our lives.

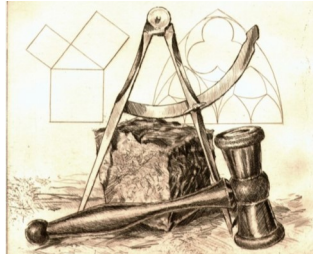

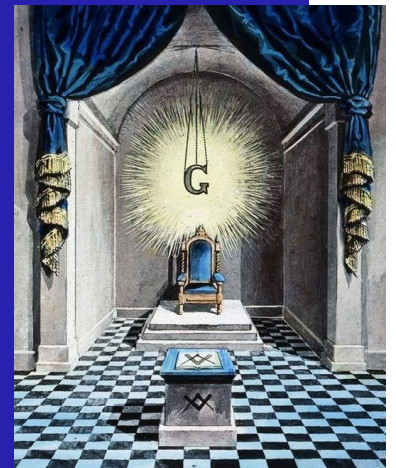

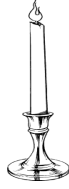
