Since its beginning, the goal of Lubbock Masonic Lodge #1392 has been to have a sustainable and thriving membership. As you probably already know, all membership based organizations, from churches, sports leagues, scouting, professional associations, labor unions, chambers of commerce and other civic groups are all experiencing accelerating membership declines with numbers of new members not keeping pace with aging memberships resulting in nancial hardship.

If you will recall, I sent out a letter earlier in the current Masonic year detailing some of the financial issues facing our lodge.

I want to inform you that we have received an offer to buy our lodge building from Brother Neal Turner of Daylight Masonic Lodge #1443 in the amount of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000). The sale of the building would be "as is" in its current condition, and the lodge will make no repairs or improvements or give the buyer any credits to do so. A resolution stating

Final preparations for the 53rd Anniversary Hilltop meeting will be Monday April 29 and


Hilltop itself will be is Saturday, May 4.

And last but not least, this month's stated meeting on April 12th is our DDGM visit with RW Terry Ewing. All area Master Masons are invited to attend.



The Oldest Masonic Lodge in the World

The oldest Masonic Lodge in the world (with verifiable lodge minutes) is Lodge of Edinburgh No. 1, Edinburgh, Scotland.

In July, 1949, it observed its 350th anniversary of its establishment. As of 2016, Lodge of Edinburgh No. 1 is 417 years old.

Oldest Masonic Lodge Minutes - July 31, 1599: Lodge of Edinburgh No. 1 has records to prove its long time existence as the Oldest Masonic Lodge. Most impressively, its first 5 pages of minutes incorporate the Schaw Statutes which are dated December 28, 1598.

Six months later, on July 31, 1599, are to be found the minutes which confirm the lodge's claim as having the oldest existing Masonic minutes. It must be noted, however, that from these minutes there exists no conclusive evidence that the lodge was actually constituted on this date nor that it is, in actuality, the oldest lodge.

Schaw Statutes: The Schaw Statutes (part of the Old Charges) are named for William Schaw, who was Master of Work to His Majesty and General Warden of the Masonic craft. In these Statutes, he declared that theses ordinances issued by him for the regulation of lodges considered the lodge at Edinburgh to be for all time, the first and principal lodge in Scotland.

Lodge of Edinburgh No. 1 was first called "The Lodge of Edinburgh" and retained this name until 1688, when the Grand Lodge of Scotland confirmed its charter, designating it as "The Lodge of Edinburgh (Mary's Chapel) No. 1"

Prominent members belonging to the Lodge of

Edinburgh in its very early days were:

- His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales (afterward called King Edward VII)
- His Royal Highness King Edward VIII Both were affiliated with the lodge, taking the obligation on the "Breeches Bible", which was printed in 1587. The pen with which these 2 brothers signed the

roll is still preserved in the Edinburgh Lodge No. 1 museum.



INTERPRETATION OF THE RITUAL OF THE THIRD DEGREE

Part 2 of 4

The second step is to recognize that the ritual of the Third Degree is, by its nature, and of purpose, such as lawfully to have many meanings; it is not intended to be a lesson written complete, finished, closed up; but rather to be a pointing, out of paths, a new departure, a series of inspirations, an awakening of all the faculties, like a great drama, picture or symphony to

which one may evermore return to find new meanings as in an inexhaustible fountain-head of truth.

For this reason there may be a number of interpretations of the Degree, and they may all be true at one and the same time. It is, for example, lawful to explain it as a drama of old age, with its attendant losses, sorrows, evils, and its final end. It is also lawful to find in it a drama of the immortality of the soul, how in it is set forth the truth that while a man withers away and perishes

there is that in him which perishes not.
